



How to Vote in Arizona

Voters with disabilities, get ready and vote in the General Election on or before November 3, 2020, with this voter guide, prepared by AAPD's REV UP.



1. Registering to Vote

- **How can I register to vote?** You can register online at Arizona's [elections website](#) or by downloading and mailing [this form](#). If you have already registered, you double-check your voter registration status at [vote.org](#).
- **When do I need to register?** Make sure to register by October 23. Arizona does not allow people to register on Election Day.
- **Do I need an ID?** You will likely need to have an Arizona address and an Arizona ID, or a social security number if you don't have a state ID.
- **Can I vote if I have a disability?** Yes! People with disabilities who are at least 18 years old have the right to vote. Your vote matters and is protected by laws to ensure voting is accessible, independent, and private. If you have a guardian, [you can vote if you petition the court and they rule in your favor](#). Contact your local [Protection and Advocacy agency](#) for more information.



2. Learning about the Issues

- **What people or laws can I vote for?** Enter your home address in [Ballotpedia's Sample Ballot Lookup](#) or check out your [local elections website](#) to find out what candidates or policies, usually called "ballot measures," you can vote for.



3. Voting in Person

- **Where do I need to go to vote?** Find your polling place through your local [elections website](#).

- **When can I vote?** Arizona allows in-person early voting, so you can vote between October 7 and November 2 and avoid lines on election day!
- **Can I vote from a car if the polling place is inaccessible?** Yes, certain counties in Arizona allow voters to request a ballot from a car - please check with your County Election official beforehand.
- **What if I want assistance with my ballot?** You may choose someone (except your boss, union agent, or a candidate) to assist you in marking your ballot.
- **Do I need an ID?** Yes, you will need to bring an [acceptable ID](#) to the polling place when you vote.



4. Voting by Mail

- **Can I vote by mail?** Yes, if you have a disability, you can vote by mail in Arizona. Any Arizona voter can cast a ballot-by-mail without an excuse.
- **How do I request a mail ballot?** If you are not on Arizona's Permanent Early Voting List (PEVL), you must request a [ballot-by-mail online](#) or by contacting your [County Recorder](#) by phone, or by email. You can also complete and print [this form](#) and mail, fax, or email a scanned copy to your local County Recorder.
- **When do I need to request my ballot?** The last day to request a ballot by mail is October 23. Contact your local [County Recorder](#) to request an alternative format ballot, such as large print or braille.
- **How do I fill out my ballot?** Arizona does not have an electronic ballot-by-mail for voters with disabilities, so you must complete a paper ballot. Make sure to sign your ballot or envelope when prompted, since Arizona requires this signature to match your past signatures.
- **What if I want assistance with my mail-in ballot?** You may choose someone (except your boss, union agent, or a candidate) to assist you in marking your ballot. If you are completing your ballot remotely, someone assisting you may need to complete an affidavit that will be returned with the paper ballot.
- **How do I return my ballot?** You can return your ballot by mail to your county election office, or drop it off in-person at any drop-box, [drop-off location](#), early

voting location, or Election Day voting location. Your ballot must be received by 7pm on November 3, and Arizona recommends that you mail it by October 27.

- **Do I need an ID?** You will need to provide an [acceptable ID](#) when requesting a ballot-by-mail.
- **Can I track if my ballot was counted?** Yes, you can track your mail-in ballot on Arizona's [voting info portal](#).
