



# How to Vote in Oklahoma

Voters with disabilities, get ready and vote in the General Election on or before November 3, 2020, with this voter guide, prepared by AAPD's REV UP.



## 1. Registering to Vote

- **How can I register to vote?** You can register [online](#) or by downloading and mailing this [form](#). If you have already registered, you can double-check your voter registration status at [vote.org](#).
- **When do I need to register?** Make sure to register by 10/9/2020 Oklahoma does not allow people to register on Election Day.
- **Do I need an ID?** You will likely need to have an Oklahoma address and driver's license or ID card, or a social security number if you don't have a state ID.
- **Can I vote if I have a disability?** Yes! People with disabilities who are at least 18 years old have the right to vote. Your vote matters and is protected by laws to ensure voting is accessible, independent, and private. If you have a guardian, you can still vote, unless a judge says you cannot vote. Contact your [local Protection and Advocacy agency](#) for help understanding or restoring your vote.



## 2. Learning about the Issues

- **What people or laws can I vote for?** Enter your home address in [Ballotpedia's Sample Ballot Lookup](#) to find out what is on your ballot. Learn about policy changes on the ballot, called "ballot measures," on Oklahoma's [election website](#).



### 3. Voting in Person

- **Where do I need to go to vote?** If you are registered to vote, you can find your polling place through this [online portal](#).
- **When can I vote?** Oklahoma voters can cast an absentee ballot in person from 10/29/2020 to 10/31/2020 to avoid long lines on Election Day (11/3/2020).
- **Can I vote from a car if the polling place is inaccessible?** Yes, Oklahoma does allow voters to request a ballot from a car, if a polling place is inaccessible.
- **What if I want assistance with my ballot?** You may choose someone (except your boss, union agent, or a candidate) to assist you in marking your ballot.
- **Do I need an ID?** Yes, you have to bring an [acceptable ID](#) to the polling place.



### 4. Voting by Mail

- **Can I vote by mail?** Yes, if you have a disability, you can vote absentee in Oklahoma. Any voter in your state can vote by mail without an excuse.
- **How do I request a mail ballot?** You must request a ballot through your local elections office by [mail](#), [online](#), or [in-person](#).
- **When do I need to request my ballot?** The last day to request an absentee ballot is 10/27/2020. Request your ballot as soon as possible to make sure that your ballot is received on time.
- **How do I fill out my ballot?** Oklahoma does not have an electronic absentee ballot available for voters with disabilities, so you must complete a paper ballot. You have to sign the [affidavit](#) within the absentee ballot packet which should either be notarized or submitted alongside a copy of a valid ID.
- **What if I want assistance with my ballot?** You may choose someone (except your boss, union agent, or a candidate) to assist you in marking your ballot. They must also read the [Assistant's Oath](#), print and sign their name, and provide their address. There must also be two witnesses present.
- **How do I return my ballot?** You must return the ballot to your county election board by mail or in-person. Your ballot must be received by Election Day, so request your ballot as soon as possible if you plan to vote by mail!

- **Do I need an ID?** Yes, you will need to include a photocopy of an acceptable ID in your ballot return envelope if you are not getting it notarized.
- **Can I track my ballot?** Yes, you can track your ballot on Oklahoma's [Voter Portal](#).
