



HOW TO VOTE IN ALASKA

A Quick Guide for People with Disabilities Voting in the 2022 General Election on or Before November 8, 2022.



REGISTERING TO VOTE

- **How can I register to vote?** You can register:
 - If you have already registered, you can check if you are registered to vote at vote411.org.
 - Online at Alaska's [Online Voter Registration Website](#).
 - By downloading and mailing the Alaska [mail in registration form](#).
- **When do I need to register?** Be sure to register to vote on or before October 9, 2022. Alaska does not allow people to register after this date or on Election Day for this election.
- **Do I need identification (ID) to register?** You will need to have an Alaska address and an Alaska ID card such as a driver's license, or a social security number if you don't have a state ID.
- **Can I vote if I have a disability?** Yes! People with disabilities who are 18 years old or older have the right to vote. Your vote matters and is protected by laws to make sure voting is accessible, independent, and private. If you have a guardian, you can still vote, unless a judge said you cannot vote. - **Can I vote if I have gone to jail or prison?** If you have gone to jail or prison, you should check to see if you are allowed to vote. Learn about

voting rights for people who have [gone to jail or prison](#). You can also [contact your local P&A](#).



LEARNING ABOUT THE ISSUES

- **What is a ballot?** A ballot is a list of who and what you can vote for. Your ballot will list candidates who are running for different offices, such as Senator or Representative. You vote by marking your choice on the ballot.
- **What is a ballot measure?** Sometimes, your ballot will have ballot measures. A ballot measure is a law, issue, or question that you can vote on. Voters get to decide if they agree or disagree with the ballot measure by voting yes to agree or no to disagree. You can learn about ballot measures on the Alaska [election website](#).
- **Can I look at my ballot before I go to vote?** Enter your home address in [Ballotpedia's Sample Ballot Lookup](#). This tool will give you a "sample ballot," which will show you what will be on your ballot when you vote.



VOTING IN PERSON

- **Where do I need to go to vote?** The place where you go to vote in person is called a polling place. You can find your local polling place through the Alaska election website. [Find your polling place](#).
- **Can I vote before Election Day?** Yes, Alaska allows any voter to vote in person before Election Day during the Early Voting period. The early voting period is set by the polling location, but it generally starts on October 24, 2022. Contact your local election office for more information.
- **Can I vote outside if the polling place is inaccessible?** No, Alaska does not allow voters to vote outside the polling place if it is inaccessible.

- **What if I want help with filling out my ballot?** You may choose someone to help you vote. Your helper cannot be a candidate or your boss. If you are part of a labor union at work, the person who helps you vote cannot be a representative of that labor union. [What is a labor union?](#) You may also ask for help from poll workers at the polling place.
- **Do I need an ID?** Alaska requires voters to show voter ID to vote in person. Alaska's Election Office has a list of acceptable IDs that you may bring with you. [Learn about voter ID.](#)



VOTING BY MAIL

- **Can I vote by mail?** Any voter in Alaska can vote by mail.
- **How do I request a mail ballot?** You must request a ballot through your local elections office by mail, online, fax, or email. [Request your ballot.](#)
- **Can I get an electronic vote by mail ballot?** Alaska allows voters with disabilities to request an electronic vote by mail ballot that can be filled out electronically. You can return this ballot by mail, fax, or email. [Request electronic ballot.](#)
- **When do I need to request my ballot?** The last day to request a mail ballot is October 29, 2022. The last day to request an electronic vote by mail ballot is November 7, 2022. Request your ballot as soon as possible to make sure that you receive your ballot on time.
- **Do I need to sign my ballot?** Be sure to sign your ballot or envelope when asked, since Alaska requires this signature to match one of your past signatures. You must also have someone sign your ballot as a witness.
- **What if I want help with filling out my ballot?** You should be allowed to choose someone to help you mark your ballot. This helper is called a Personal Representative. They will complete step one of the envelope with the voter's name, their own name, and their signature. They will also witness the voter's signature.

- **How do I return my ballot?** You can return your ballot by mail or in person. Voters who are blind, have low vision, have a physical disability, or have a learning disability that makes it difficult to read or mark a paper ballot may be able to return their ballot by fax or email. If you are returning your ballot by mail, it must be postmarked by November 8, 2022, and received by election officials on November 18, 2022. If you are returning your ballot in person, by fax, or by email, it must be received by November 8, 2022.
- **Can someone return my ballot for me?** Yes, you may choose to have someone pick up and return your ballot for you. This person is called a Personal Representative.
- **Do I need an ID to vote by mail?** No, you do not need an ID when voting by mail unless you are voting for the first time in a federal election in Alaska.
- **Can I track my ballot?** Yes, you can track your ballot online to see if the elections office has received it. You can do this on the Alaska election website. [Track your ballot.](#)
