



HOW TO VOTE IN DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

A Quick Guide for People with Disabilities Voting in the 2022 General Election on or Before November 8, 2022.



REGISTERING TO VOTE

- **How can I register to vote?** You can register:
 - If you have already registered, you can check if you are registered to vote at vote411.org.
 - Online at District of Columbia's [Online Voter Registration Website](#).
 - By downloading and mailing the District of Columbia [mail in registration form](#).
- **When do I need to register?** Be sure to register to vote on or before October 18, 2022, or register to vote in person on Election Day.
- **Do I need identification (ID) to register?** You will need to have a District of Columbia address and District of Columbia state ID card or driver's license. You can use your social security number if you don't have a state ID.
- **Can I vote if I have a disability?** Yes! People with disabilities who are 18 years old or older have the right to vote. Your vote matters and is protected by laws to make sure voting is accessible, independent, and private. If you have a guardian, you can still vote, unless a judge said

you cannot vote. For help understanding or getting back your right to vote, contact your local [Protection and Advocacy Agency \(P&A\)](#).

- **Can I vote if I have gone to jail or prison?** If you have gone to jail or prison, you should check to see if you are allowed to vote. Learn about voting rights for people who have [gone to jail or prison](#). You can also [contact your local P&A](#).



LEARNING ABOUT THE ISSUES

- **What is a ballot?** A ballot is a list of who and what you can vote for. Your ballot will list candidates who are running for different offices, such as Senator or Representative. You vote by marking your choice on the ballot.
- **What is a ballot measure?** Sometimes, your ballot will have ballot measures. A ballot measure is a law, issue, or question that you can vote on. Voters get to decide if they agree or disagree with the ballot measure by voting yes to agree or no to disagree. You can learn about ballot measures on the District of Columbia [election website](#).
- **Can I look at my ballot before I go to vote?** Enter your home address in [Ballotpedia's Sample Ballot Lookup](#). This tool will give you a "sample ballot," which will show you what will be on your ballot when you vote.



VOTING IN PERSON

- **Where do I need to go to vote?** The place where you go to vote in person is called a vote center. You can find your local vote center through the District of Columbia election website. [Find your vote center](#).
- **Can I vote before Election Day?** District of Columbia allows any voter to vote in person before Election Day during the Early Voting Period. You can vote between October 28, 2022 and November 3, 2022 and avoid lines on Election Day!

- **Can I vote outside if the polling place is inaccessible?** Yes, District of Columbia allows voters to vote outside the vote center if it is inaccessible. This is called curbside voting.
- **What if I want help with filling out my ballot?** You may choose someone to help you vote. Your helper cannot be a candidate or your boss. If you are part of a labor union at work, the person who helps you vote cannot be a representative of that labor union. [What is a labor union?](#) You may also ask for help from poll workers at the vote center.
- **Do I need an ID?** District of Columbia only requires first-time voters who registered to vote by mail or online to show voter ID when voting in person. [Learn about voter ID.](#)



VOTING BY MAIL

- **Can I vote by mail?** Any voter in the District of Columbia can vote by mail-in ballot.
- **How do I request a mail ballot?** If you are registered to vote, District of Columbia will automatically send you a mail ballot. You must register to vote by October 18, 2022.
- **Can I get an electronic vote by mail ballot?** District of Columbia allows some voters with disabilities to request an electronic ballot that they can fill out and return electronically. [Request electronic ballot.](#)
- **Do I need to sign my ballot?** Be sure to sign your envelope when asked. If you need help with writing your signature, you must fill out a form called the "Attestation Form for Signature Assistance."
- **What if I want help with filling out my ballot?** You should be allowed to choose someone to help you with filling out your ballot. Someone helping you may need to complete a statement to be returned with the ballot. You will need to fill out the form called the "Attestation Form for Assistance."

- **How do I return my ballot?** You can return your ballot by mail to the elections office. You can also deliver your ballot to voting centers during Early Voting and on Election Day, or to a ballot drop box. If you are returning your ballot by mail, it must be postmarked by November 8, 2022, and received by election officials on November 18, 2022. If you are returning your ballot in person, it must be received by November 8, 2022.
- **Can someone return my ballot for me?** Yes, you may choose to have someone return your ballot for you.
- **Do I need an ID to vote by mail?** No, you do not need an ID when voting by mail unless you are voting for the first time in a federal election in District of Columbia.
- **Can I track my ballot?** Yes, you can track your ballot online to see if the elections office has received it. You can do this on the District of Columbia election website. [Track your ballot.](#)
