



# HOW TO VOTE IN WEST VIRGINIA

A Quick Guide for People with Disabilities Voting in the 2022 General Election on or Before November 8, 2022.



## REGISTERING TO VOTE

- **How can I register to vote?** You can register:
  - If you have already registered, you can check if you are registered to vote at [vote411.org](https://www.vote411.org).
  - Online at West Virginia's [Online Voter Registration Website](#).
  - By downloading and mailing the West Virginia [mail in registration form](#).
- **When do I need to register?** Be sure to register to vote on or before October 18, 2022. West Virginia does not allow people to register after this date or on Election Day for this election.
- **Do I need identification (ID) to register?** You will need to have a West Virginia address and West Virginia state ID card or driver's license. You can use your social security number if you don't have a state ID.
- **Can I vote if I have a disability?** Yes! People with disabilities who are 18 years old or older have the right to vote. Your vote matters and is protected by laws to make sure voting is accessible, independent, and private. If you have a guardian, it is likely that you are not allowed to vote, but you may be able to get your right to vote back. - **Can I vote if I have gone to jail or prison?** If you have gone to jail or prison, you should check to see if you are allowed to vote. Learn about voting rights for people who have [gone to jail or prison](#). You can also [contact your local P&A](#).



## LEARNING ABOUT THE ISSUES

- **What is a ballot?** A ballot is a list of who and what you can vote for. Your ballot will list candidates who are running for different offices, such as Senator or Representative. You vote by marking your choice on the ballot.
- **What is a ballot measure?** Sometimes, your ballot will have ballot measures. A ballot measure is a law, issue, or question that you can vote on. Voters get to decide if they agree or disagree with the ballot measure by voting yes to agree or no to disagree. You can learn about ballot measures on the West Virginia [election website](#).
- **Can I look at my ballot before I go to vote?** Enter your home address in [Ballotpedia's Sample Ballot Lookup](#). This tool will give you a "sample ballot," which will show you what will be on your ballot when you vote.



## VOTING IN PERSON

- **Where do I need to go to vote?** The place where you go to vote in person is called a polling place. You can find your local polling place through the West Virginia election website. [Find your polling place](#).
- **Can I vote before Election Day?** West Virginia allows any voter to vote in person before Election Day during the Early Voting period. You can vote between October 26, 2022 and November 5, 2022 to avoid lines on Election Day!
- **Can I vote outside if the polling place is inaccessible?** Yes, West Virginia does allow voters to vote outside the polling place if it is inaccessible. This is called curbside voting.

- **What if I want help with filling out my ballot?** You may choose someone to help you vote. Your helper cannot be a candidate or your boss. If you are part of a labor union at work, the person who helps you vote cannot be a representative of that labor union. [What is a labor union?](#) You may also ask for help from poll workers at the polling place.
- **Do I need an ID?** West Virginia requires voters to show ID to vote in person. [Learn about voter ID.](#)



## VOTING BY MAIL

- **Can I vote by mail?** If you have a disability or are away from home on Election Day, you may vote by mail in West Virginia. This is called absentee voting. [What is absentee voting?](#)
- **How do I request a mail ballot?** You must apply for an absentee ballot by mail, fax, or email. [Request your ballot.](#)
- **Can I get an electronic absentee ballot?** West Virginia allows voters with disabilities to request an electronic absentee ballot that they can fill out and return electronically. [Request electronic ballot.](#)
- **When do I need to request my ballot?** The last day to request an absentee ballot is November 2, 2022. Request your ballot as soon as possible to make sure you receive your ballot on time.
- **Do I need to sign my ballot?** Be sure to sign your ballot or envelope when asked, since West Virginia requires this signature to match one of your past signatures.
- **What if I want help with filling out my ballot?** You should be allowed to choose someone to help you with filling out your ballot. Someone helping you may need to complete a statement called an affidavit to be returned with the ballot. [What is an affidavit?](#)
- **How do I return my ballot?** You can return your ballot by mail or in person. If you are returning your ballot by mail, it must be postmarked

by November 8, 2022, and received by election officials by November 14, 2022. If you are returning your ballot in person, it must be received by November 7, 2022.

- **Can someone return my ballot for me?** Yes, you may choose to have someone return your ballot for you. This person may only deliver the ballots of two voters other than themselves to the election office.
- **Do I need an ID to vote by mail?** No, you do not need an ID when voting an absentee ballot by mail unless you are voting for the first time in a federal election in West Virginia.
- **Can I track my ballot?** Yes, you can track your ballot online to see if the elections office has received it. You can do this on the West Virginia election website. [Track your ballot.](#)
