



HOW TO VOTE IN OHIO

A Quick Guide for People with Disabilities Voting in the 2022 General Election on or Before November 8, 2022.



REGISTERING TO VOTE

- **How can I register to vote?** You can register:
 - If you have already registered, you can check if you are registered to vote at vote411.org.
 - Online at Ohio's [Online Voter Registration Website](#).
 - By downloading and mailing the Ohio [mail in registration form](#).
- **When do I need to register?** Be sure to register to vote on or before October 11, 2022. Ohio does not allow people to register after this date or on Election Day for this election.
- **Do I need identification (ID) to register?** You will need to have an Ohio address and Ohio state ID card or driver's license. You can use your social security number if you don't have a state ID.
- **Can I vote if I have a disability?** Yes! People with disabilities who are 18 years old or older have the right to vote. Your vote matters and is protected by laws to make sure voting is accessible, independent, and private. If you have a guardian, you can still vote, unless a judge said you cannot vote. - **Can I vote if I have gone to jail or prison?** If you have gone to jail or prison, you should check to see if you are allowed to vote. Learn about

voting rights for people who have [gone to jail or prison](#). You can also [contact your local P&A](#).



LEARNING ABOUT THE ISSUES

- **What is a ballot?** A ballot is a list of who and what you can vote for. Your ballot will list candidates who are running for different offices, such as Senator or Representative. You vote by marking your choice on the ballot.
- **What is a ballot measure?** Sometimes, your ballot will have ballot measures. A ballot measure is a law, issue, or question that you can vote on. Voters get to decide if they agree or disagree with the ballot measure by voting yes to agree or no to disagree. You can learn about ballot measures on the Ohio [election website](#).
- **Can I look at my ballot before I go to vote?** Enter your home address in [Ballotpedia's Sample Ballot Lookup](#). This tool will give you a "sample ballot," which will show you what will be on your ballot when you vote.



VOTING IN PERSON

- **Where do I need to go to vote?** The place where you go to vote in person is called a polling place. You can find your local polling place through the Ohio election website. [Find your polling place](#).
- **Can I vote before Election Day?** Any voter may vote early in person before Election Day during the Early Voting period. You may vote between November 1, 2022 and November 7, 2022 and avoid lines on Election Day!
- **Can I vote outside if the polling place is inaccessible?** Yes, Ohio does allow voters to vote outside the polling place if it is inaccessible. This is called curbside voting.
- **What if I want help with filling out my ballot?** You may choose someone to help you vote. Your helper cannot be a candidate or your

boss. If you are part of a labor union at work, the person who helps you vote cannot be a representative of that labor union. [What is a labor union?](#) You may also ask for help from poll workers at the polling place.

- **Do I need an ID?** Ohio requires voters to show ID to vote in person. [Learn about voter ID.](#)



VOTING BY MAIL

- **Can I vote by mail?** Any voter in Ohio can vote by mail. This is called absentee voting. [What is absentee voting?](#)
- **How do I request a mail ballot?** You must request your absentee ballot by mail from the county elections office. [Request your ballot.](#)
- **Can I get an electronic absentee ballot?** Ohio allows voters with disabilities to request an electronic absentee ballot that they can fill out electronically, print, and return. [Request electronic ballot.](#)
- **When do I need to request my ballot?** The last day to request your ballot is November 5, 2022. Request your ballot as soon as possible to make sure that you receive your ballot on time.
- **Do I need to sign my ballot?** Be sure to sign your ballot or envelope when asked, since Ohio requires this signature to match one of your past signatures.
- **What if I want help with filling out my ballot?** You should be allowed to choose someone to help you with filling out your ballot.
- **How do I return my ballot?** You can return your ballot by mail or in person. If you are returning your ballot by mail, it must be postmarked by November 7, 2022 and received by election officials on November 18, 2022. If you are returning your ballot in person, it must be received by 7:30 p.m. on November 8, 2022.
- **Can someone return my ballot for me?** You may have a family member return your ballot for you. This family member can be a parent,

grandparent, sibling, stepparent, stepchild, uncle, aunt, nephew, niece, mother in law, or father in law.

- **Do I need an ID to vote by mail?** No, you do not need an ID when voting an absentee ballot by mail unless you are voting for the first time in a federal election in Ohio.
- **Can I track my ballot?** Yes, you can track your ballot online to see if the elections office has received it. You can do this on the Ohio election website. [Track your ballot.](#)
